

## Scholarship Resources Handout

**STEP 1: Complete a FAFSA** (Free Application for Federal Financial Student Aid) or **ORSAA** (Oregon Student Aid Application): Most scholarships require a completed FAFSA or ORSAA to determine financial need. You need to renew your FAFSA each starting: **December** – [FAFSA® Application | Federal Student Aid](#) . Apply early each year to get the most free money (Oregon Opportunity Grant, [Work Study](#), etc)!

**STEP 2: APPLY FOR... (refer to comparison chart on page 3)**

☐ **PCC Foundation Scholarship Application**

Offers over 250 scholarships (\$2.3 million a year) for PCC students. \*Average award is \$1800, but varies from \$700 to \$5000 a year. The online scholarship application opens November 1st. ☐ **Oregon Student Access & Completion (OSAC) Scholarship Application**

Administers over 600+ private Oregon scholarships (\$10 million annually)! Online application available on Nov. 1. Early Bird Deadline is February 15. Final Deadline is **April 1 at 5pm**. [www.oregonstudentaid.gov](http://www.oregonstudentaid.gov)

☐ **Ford Family Foundation Scholarship** (nearly a full-ride scholarship covering the majority of your college costs)

Apply for Oregon's largest private scholarship, which pays up to 90% of unmet financial need with a limit of \$40,000 per year (renewable each year). There are three: Ford Opportunity (parents of any age **OR** adult learners 25 years or older), Ford Transfer (community college students under the age of 25), & Ford Scholar (HS or GED student). Opens December 1st. Deadline is **March 1 at 5pm**. [www.tfff.org](http://www.tfff.org)

☐ **University Scholarships for Transfer Students**

If you intend to transfer to a university, check out the scholarship page on the university website. There are many scholarships to look for such as scholarships for transfer students, scholarships for certain majors, diversity scholarships...and more. Many Oregon universities have a **February deadline**.

☐ **Phi Theta Kappa Scholarships (PCC's Honor Society)**

Scholarships are the #1 reason students join PTK. To qualify, students must have achieved a 3.5 cumulative GPA or higher and at least 12 credits completed in college level coursework. PTK offers nearly \$1 million in scholarships to help complete an associate degree or prepare for transfer to a four-year college. Fall deadline is **December 1, 2023**, and Spring deadline is TBA. There is a one time membership fee of \$100.

● Membership fee waiver assistance is very limited. Email [pcc-ptk-group@pcc.edu](mailto:pcc-ptk-group@pcc.edu) to state interest in PTK and to request assistance based on financial need.

**PCC Essays:** Each essay can be up to 350 words. (Some scholarships ask for additional essays to be considered)

1. What is your career goal and educational plan to meet this goal? What inspired you to choose this field of study and career?
2. What is your greatest strength or characteristic and how will this help you to be successful at PCC?

**OSAC Essays:** (250 words each).

1. What are your specific educational plans and career goals and why? What motivates you to achieve them?
2. What have you done for your family, school, or community that you care about the most and why?
3. Describe a personal accomplishment, impactful change or experience that has occurred in your life. What skills and strengths were needed to respond, and what did you learn about yourself?
4. Is there any additional information you would like the selection committee members to know? This could include financial situations not reflected on the FAFSA or ORSAA or other information not covered in the application. This statement is not required and will not have any negative effect on the application if left blank.

**Ford Family Foundation Essays** (150 words each)

1. What have you done for your family or community that you care about the most and why? Provide specific examples.
2. Describe a skill, ability or knowledge you have developed that you are proud of. How did you develop it and why is it important to you?
3. What are you known for among people who know you well? What would you like to be known for and how will college help you achieve that?

Think of the place(s) you grew up or consider home. What lessons have you learned living there and how have they shaped who you are today?
