# You have been invited to participate in a survey coordinated through Portland Community College's Office of Institutional Effectiveness.

This page is will inform you about this Office's policies, standards, and best practices concerning institutional research and student data.

- If you choose to participate in any survey coordinated through this Office, it is completely voluntary. You do not need to feel obligated to complete a survey if you do want to for any reason.
- This Office follows all College policies including the <u>Educational Records Policy</u>, FERPA (The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act), and <u>Information Security Policies and Standards</u>.

## All surveys coordinated through this Office comply with the following standards:

- 1. There is an unlikely risk of harm to participants.
- 2. There is either a direct benefit to participants or an indirect benefit resulting in institutional improvement and/or effectiveness.
- 3. Responses to the survey will be kept confidential and private. Private means responses collected from a survey will be non-identifiable to PCC staff and faculty outside of a research/evaluation team. All surveys disseminated on July 3, 2018 and after will clearly identify the research/evaluation team and provide contact information for the team.
- 4. Any and all information collected from a survey that is shared outside of the research/evaluation team will be made non-identifiable. Identifiable information in open comments will be redacted and multiple choice responses will be aggregated (shared by non-identifiable groups).

### Best Practices of this Office

Regarding student data and privacy, there are two types of surveys this Office uses.

#### Anonymous

This type of survey ensures that no one can connect your survey responses to your identity. Creating anonymous surveys requires:

- 1. NOT asking for personally identifiable information (for example: name, email, ID numbers, birthdate, place of birth, address, telephone numbers)
- 2. NOT using email addresses as a way to invite participants to a survey
- 3. USING anonymous links to the survey portal
- 4. Anonymizing responses by NOT collecting longitude/latitude and IP addresses from technology devices

#### **Private**

This type of survey ensures that any disclosure of survey responses that are linked to personally identifiable information comply with FERPA and are guided by best practices in Social-Behavioral-Educational Human Subjects Research informed by the code of federal regulations for the protection of human subjects (<u>Title 45</u>).

This privacy practice is consistent with FERPA where the right to consent to disclosure is not required when disclosure is to other school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the college in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position; a person or company with whom the college has contracted or appointed as its agent; or a student serving on an official committee or assisting another school official in performing the official's tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an educational record in order to fulfill their professional responsibilities.
