

**Prerequisite Opt-out Work Group
Minutes, June 1, 2007**

ART requests to opt out of WR, RD and MTH Prerequisites:

Resubmitted when Work Group requested more specific rationale.

Several items were removed from the list of original requests and have been omitted from the list below: four of the five photography courses (which will get the standard prereqs). Calligraphy courses were not re-submitted, but are 2 cr and not on Gen Ed list

The arguments presented by ART were based on studio art being a different kind of literacy, and allowing students to develop different ways of “knowing”. They argued that not only is there no correlation between success in studio ART courses and traditional academic achievement, there may be a correlation to the contrary. Students may also find, when working with the physical world of studio art, a way to develop the rigorous application of process and follow-through, as well as a different way to express their higher thought processes, and can be a way for some student to get thought the academic system. Studio art courses are offered in the lec lab format, and do not rely on texts.

Recommended (7 in favor; 1 opposed)

The SAC arguments reflect research and discussion into the question of including the MTH 20 prerequisite. Rationale for opt out provided by the ENG SAC (and others) focused on the specific skills and content of MTH 20, as well as some evidence that success in MTH 20 is not a predictor of success in ENG courses. On this basis their request was recommended. ENG 197 added because its omission was an oversight.

Recommended

The rationale presented by ASL was that American Sign Language was based on the considerable differences between reading and writing in English, and communicating via sign. Texts used, even in the 200-level courses, have very little that the student needs to read. Experience that preparedness in English has not been a strong predictor of success in ASL.

CS Courses Requesting to opt-out of WR, RD and MTH Prerequisites

137. CS 160 – Exploring Computer Science – First Year German
138. CS 161 – Computer Science

Recommended (7 in favor; 1 opposed)

The rationale presented by CS was based on the fact that many, possibly the majority of students take these courses via DL, and many of those are not “PCC” students, but students from other institutions. Blocking students automatically would have an enormous effect on enrollment.

The arguments were not based on students not needing RD, WR and MTH skills – to the contrary, the course descriptions include specific recommendations:

For CS 160 Recommended: computer Literacy (such as completion of CIS 120; placement at MTH 65 and RD 115.

For CS 161: Recommended: MTH 111; WR 121; CS 160 or CIS 122

These recommendations do seem to adequately communicate the expectation of the course to students, and the argument relating to the preponderance of students being not “traditional” was convincing to the Work Group. Concern was expressed that students should get some feedback on their progress in the course before the drop period expires.

The Work Group noted that the DL concerns may not be peculiar to CS, and make note of the need for monitoring impact on enrollment in DL sections in other areas.

**SOC courses requesting to opt out of WR and MTH Prerequisites.
RD 115 prerequisite is accepted**

140. SOC 204 – General Sociology: Sociology in Everyday Life

Recommended. (6 in favor; 2 opposed)

The SAC had originally intended to opt out for all 16 of the courses on the Gen Ed list, but settled on this one. One argument is that it is identical to the course that is offered at PSU (SOC 22), and has no prerequisites there, so it would be inconsistent to have prerequisites on this one.

Questions were raised as to whether students could be successful without skill in writing. SAC representatives discussed the fact that different instructors use a variety assessment techniques, and so for some sections, writing is not an issue. In courses where writing is used, instructors evaluate based on content rather than skill in expression. They also argue that students develop writing skill through the assessment activities of the course.

With regards to math, use of graphs, percentages and fractions was acknowledged, but it is not a dominant feature of any course, and instructors typically walk the class through the math elements, not assuming understanding of these presentations.

It was noted that this will become the only Social Science course on the Gen Ed list to NOT have the prerequisites in WR and MTH. This may change the population of students taking the course, and the SAC should be attentive to this potential shift. The SOC SAC does feel that having course available to student as they develop their literacy is in students best interest.

Also, it should be noted that SOC 205 and 206, which require SOC 204 will still have the prerequisites.
